

The Final Step? Why Financing a County Coroner Facility fits Idaho Health Facilities Authority's Mission and Purpose

The Ada County Coroner's Office is the largest in the state of Idaho and serves Ada County, Idaho's most populous county and Boise, the state's largest city. The Ada County Coroner's office provides pathology and other services to 34 of the 44 counties in Idaho

and about three quarters of the Idaho's population. The Ada County Coroner has been operating in a converted warehouse facility originally constructed in 1966 that is woefully inadequate to its needs-- particularly in response to increased demand for services during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Ada County Coroner's office approached Idaho Health Facilities Authority (IHFA)

and its counsel earlier this year to explore the idea of a conduit financing to fund a new facility.

IHFA was created for the purpose of providing better healthcare to the state of Idaho by assisting with the acquisition and construction of health facilities in the State. It is an essential goal to provide people of Idaho with adequate medical care and health facilities. IHFA receives its powers from the Idaho Health Facilities Authority Act, Sections 39-1441 and is explicitly authorized to make loans or lease "health facilities" to qualifying "health institutions." The Act defines "health institutions" as "a structure or building, suitable for use as ...healthcare facility, laboratory... administration building, research facility...mental and physical healthcare facility...medical teaching facility, or



other structures or facilities related to any of the foregoing or required or useful for the operation of a health facility." Presumably, the proper interpretation of the Act requires IHFA to focus on providing health care to Idaho residents, likely living and breathing Idaho residents. If the duties of the Coroner's Office were to be nothing more than acting as a way station or transportation service to get bodies to a mortuary or to simply investigate deaths, then IHFA would not have the power to finance the project. However, the Ada County Coroner's Office performs many other services and functions that would qualify the project as a *Continued on Page 8*

"health facility" for purposes of the Act, such as:

• Public Health—The Coroner's Office works closely with the State Board of Pharmacy and the State Board of Medicine on healthcare crises within the State, such as the opioid epidemic, COVID-19, and other infectious disease outbreaks. This involves initially tracking information related to causes of deaths, and then taking that information and working with other institutions to create programs, guidelines and regulations to mitigate such deaths in the future. In this capacity, the Coroner's Office is performing many duties similar to those performed by Idaho's Health Districts, whose buildings have been financed by IHFA.

• Public Health/COVID-19—The role of the Coroner's Office's in public health issues has been illuminated by the current crisis. While COVID-19 deaths in hospitals are addressed by other agencies, the Coroner's Office has been involved with suspected COVID-19 deaths that have to obtain assistance and resources.

• Research/Medical Teaching Facility—The Coroner's Office has been working with the new medical school located on the Idaho State University campus in Ada County regarding fellowships and establishing a forensic pathology program, residency and clinical pro-

grams along with cadaver research and education.

• ForensicPathology/laboratory/research— The Ada County Coroner provides forensic pathology services to Ada and 33 other counties and is one of two such facilities in Idaho. This allows the doctors to have a much broader scope than simply Ada County, and gives them the opportunity to undertake research.

• Mental Health—The project's design allows the Coroner's Office to be able to provide in-house (1) an employee wellness program, as well as (2) family grief counseling. The services offered would be very similar to those currently provided to Idaho's first responders.

IHFA and our legal counsel have determined, based



on the above information, that the project will satisfy the d definition of a "health facility" and that IHFA's statutory powers authorize IHFA to issue bonds on behalf of the County to finance the Project.

Efforts are underway to price this ground-

occurred at home. This involves not simply determining the cause of death and coordinating responses with the State Epidemiologist, but also reaching out directly to families about exposure, tracking down others who may have been exposed, and finally assisting those individuals breaking \$30 million bond issue at the end of September 2020 and close the issue in October. IHFA is pleased to act as issuer for the project and to continue to serve our mission of improving healthcare in Idaho.


